# Building strong, healthy families and capable children

Family Service Rochester was founded in 1965 as a nonprofit organization with a staff of three and the mission to support and enhance the dignity and quality of life for individuals and families in our community.

Today the agency provides more than 30 programs to meet ever-changing community needs. Our staff of over 135 provides a wide range of human services that strengthen, support, protect, educate and empower individuals and families in our community.



What sets us apart from other organizations are the Principles of Partnership we use to deliver the services we provide:

*Everyone Desires Respect:* We acknowledge the uniqueness and dignity of every consumer, volunteer, donor, staff member, and guest. *Everyone Needs to be Understood*: We practice compassion and empathy by truly listening to what others are saying.

*Everyone Has Strengths*: We first look for and acknowledge the many resources, past successes, abilities, talents, and dreams of others. *Judgments Can Wait*: We acknowledge and set aside our own assumptions, values and beliefs.

Partners Share Power: We are mindful of our responsibility to empower others.

Partnership is a Process: We recognize that partnership develops over time.

Embracing these principles has allowed our organization to grow tremendously. In 2019, we served over 3500 households in Southeast Minnesota, a 15% increase in households over the last year. Some of the 2019 accomplishments are listed below.



### **Child Welfare**

- Partnered with Olmsted County on their Pathways to Prosperity and Well-Being intiative addressing economic mobility using a two generation, whole family approach
- State, national, and international leaders approached FSR to provide information, training, and consultation on the work we are doing to support families and children

### **Mental Health**


- Expanded Therapeutic Services into Dodge, Goodhue, Steele, Wabasha, and Waseca counties
- Partnered with Families First to begin School Based Therapist services into Early Head Start
- Clinical Academy continued to thrive and gained national attention

### **Senior Independence**

- Expanded Neighbors Helping Neighbors (NHN) to City of Faribault in Rice County
- Added paid Household Helper positions to reduce consumer's wait time for services
- Delivered 60% of NHN services through volunteer support in order to maintain a sliding fee scale
- Inaugurated Meals on Wheels fundraising gala Denim, Diamonds, and Dice

# **Child Welfare**

**FATHER Project** exists to assist fathers in overcoming barriers that prevent them from supporting their children economically and emotionally. Through a wide array of services including career development, case management, parenting support groups, along with father/family activities, FATHER Project staff are able to help dads become more actively involved in their children's lives. In 2019, over 70 fathers benefitted from receiving services many of which obtained employment, secured stable housing, and reported increased parenting skills. In partnership with Olmsted County Child Support Office, FATHER Project has also witnessed increases in financial support for children of FATHER Project participants.

Through FSR's 10 child welfare programs, licensed social workers engage families in partnership to support safety, stability, mental health, and child and family wellbeing. Our collaborative effort with Olmsted County Child & Family Services offers families the needed support to address each family's individualized needs.



# Mental Health

The mental health clinical team is comprised of 36 staff members who partner with individuals, children, and families to provide counseling services, walking side by side along life's journey.

We have four clinical program areas. In 2019 we served:

Outpatient Services	<b>775</b> Clients Served	<b>7,293</b> Service Hours
Family Based Services	<b>202</b> Families Served	<b>8,807</b> Service Hours
School Based Mental Health	<b>371</b> Clients Served	<b>4,697</b> Service Hours

**Outpatient Mental Health Services** added Eye Movement Desensitization and Reprocessing (EMDR) therapy. This is an interactive therapy technique used to relieve psychological stress, most often related to a trauma event.

**Clinical Academy** accepted 16 master level interns to work in multiple sites and program areas. This program gained national attention for its innovative approach to providing unique clinical internship experiences.

Our clinical programs continued to grow not only in size, but also geographically.


**Collaborative Intensive Bridging Services** expanded into four additional counties, Dodge, Goodhue, Steele, and Waseca.

School-Based Mental Health Services Plainview-Elgin-Millville School District approached us requesting a therapist for their elementary school, allowing us to expand these services into Wabasha County.



## **Senior Independence**

Neighbors Helping Neighbors and Meals on Wheels are about people remaining active, engaged and healthy. Mark and Ruth just celebrated 65 years of marriage and 62 years in their home. They've relied on their children and grandchildren for lawn, snow and other tasks for many years. "Everyone's grown and gone now" remarks Ruth. "And things get harder to do these days you know". Mark's doctor noticed some profound weight loss and suggested Meals on Wheels for a hearty meal each day. Following an in-home visit with FSR staff, both Mark and Ruth began home delivered meals as well as seasonal outside chores and help with house cleaning 2X a month. "With a little help the house work doesn't get out of control" added Ruth.





When Mark returned to his doctor 3 months later, she was pleased to note Mark's weight gain and improved vitality. Now when family visits they spend time together playing cards, visiting, and going out—not just doing chores.

Meals on Wheels diners may order meals up to 7 days a week. Neighbors Helping Neighbors offers a variety of chores, transportation, companionship, social activities and engagement opportunities in Olmsted and Rice counties. Senior Independence services assist older adults and persons with disabilities to remain living safely in the homes and neighborhoods they love.

Through Neighbors Helping Neighbors (NHN) volunteers and vendors provide services that include household maintenance and repair, friendly visiting, housekeeping, transportation, grocery shopping, snow removal, lawn care, spring and fall cleanup, and home safety checks.

### **Meadow Park Initiative**

Meadow Park Initiative's long-term goal is to improve the quality of living and health outcomes of residents through neighborhood renewal. Our Spanish and Somali speaking community organizers have established trust and built relationships with residents to empower residents and implement community level improvements.

Olmsted County joined the AARP Network of Age-Friendly States and Communities. The network helps participating communities become great places to live for people of all ages.


